27J Schools 2022 Mill Levy Override Survey Topline Results

Magellan Strategies is pleased to present the topline results of a live telephone and online, bilingual survey of 938 registered voters within the 27J Schools boundary. The interviews were conducted from July 26th - 29th, 2022. This survey has a margin of error of +/- 3.18% at the 95 percent confidence interval. The survey data was weighted to be representative of the voter turnout demographics within 27J Schools for a midterm election cycle. These topline results also show the differences between 27J parents (30% of the total) and non-parents (70% of the total) living in the district.

T21. 27J Schools is considering a ballot measure in November asking voters to approve an 8 mill property tax increase, also known as a Mill Levy Override. Revenue from a Mill Levy Override can be used for operational expenses, such as programs and staff, and is not used for construction or repair of buildings.

An 8 mill property tax increase would raise \$16 million annually and would cost a homeowner \$55.60 per year per \$100,000 of a home's assessed value.

Revenue from the property tax increase would allow 27J to compete with other districts to recruit and retain experienced teachers and student support staff by increasing salaries closer to the market average. It would also allow the District to hire additional teachers and provide additional resources for career-focused instruction so that students gain the skills they need for jobs and careers. The revenue would also be used to hire school safety officers to increase protection for students and staff.

T22. As you may know, last year voters approved a \$515 million bond issue at no increase in tax rates. The bond will pay for the construction of at least five new schools in 27J, as well as renovations across the district. While a bond can only be used to pay for school buildings and construction, only a mill levy increase can be used to pay for 27J teachers, staff and learning programs for students. 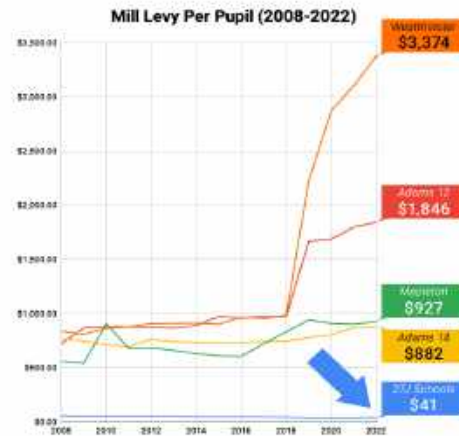

Survey Methodology

This data collection for this survey employed MMS text messages and live telephone interviews among registered voters within the 27J Schools boundary. The survey response data was weighted to reflect the voter turnout demographics for a midterm election in 27J Schools. The survey was also available in Spanish. The interviews were conducted from July 26th - 29th, 2022. This survey has a margin of error of +/- 3.18% at the 95 percent confidence interval.
