

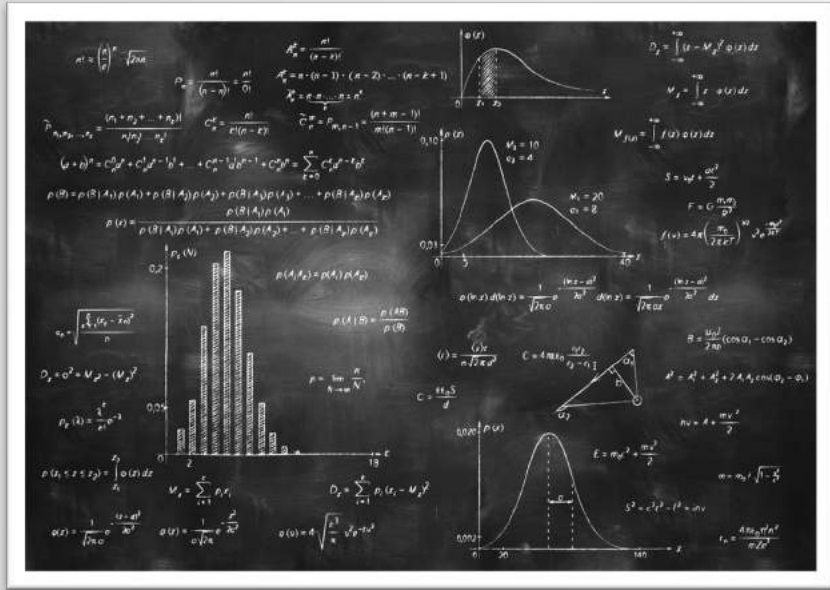


Town of Eagle Home Rule Charter Voter Opinion Survey

February 4 to 14th, 2019



Methodology



Magellan Strategies is pleased to present the results of a 332n live telephone and online survey of likely 2019 general election voters in the Town of Eagle, Colorado. The interviews were conducted from February 4th to 14th, 2019.

The overall survey has a margin of error of +/- 5.18% at the 95% confidence interval. Subgroups of voters will have higher margin of error than the overall population.

The survey results were weighted based upon past voter turnout demographics for an odd-year election cycle in Eagle, Colorado. David Flaherty was the principal researcher on this project, and Courtney Sievers was the project director.

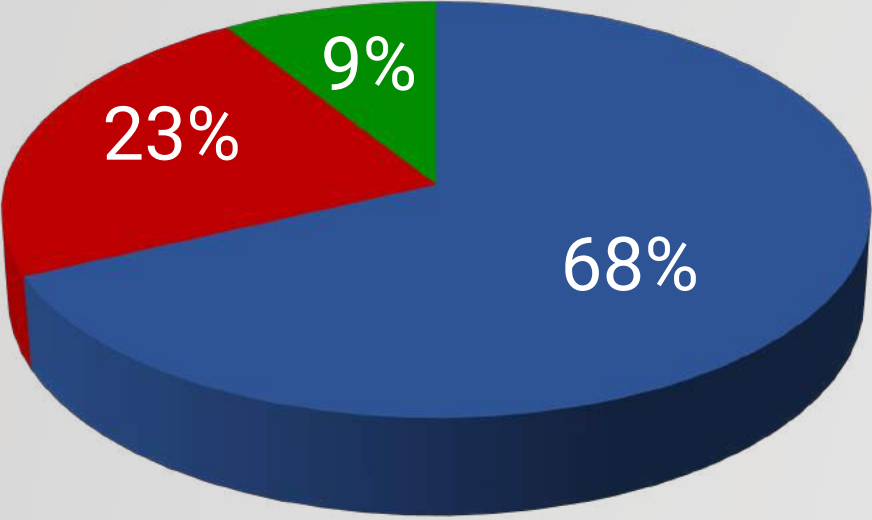


Town of Eagle General Election Survey Demographics

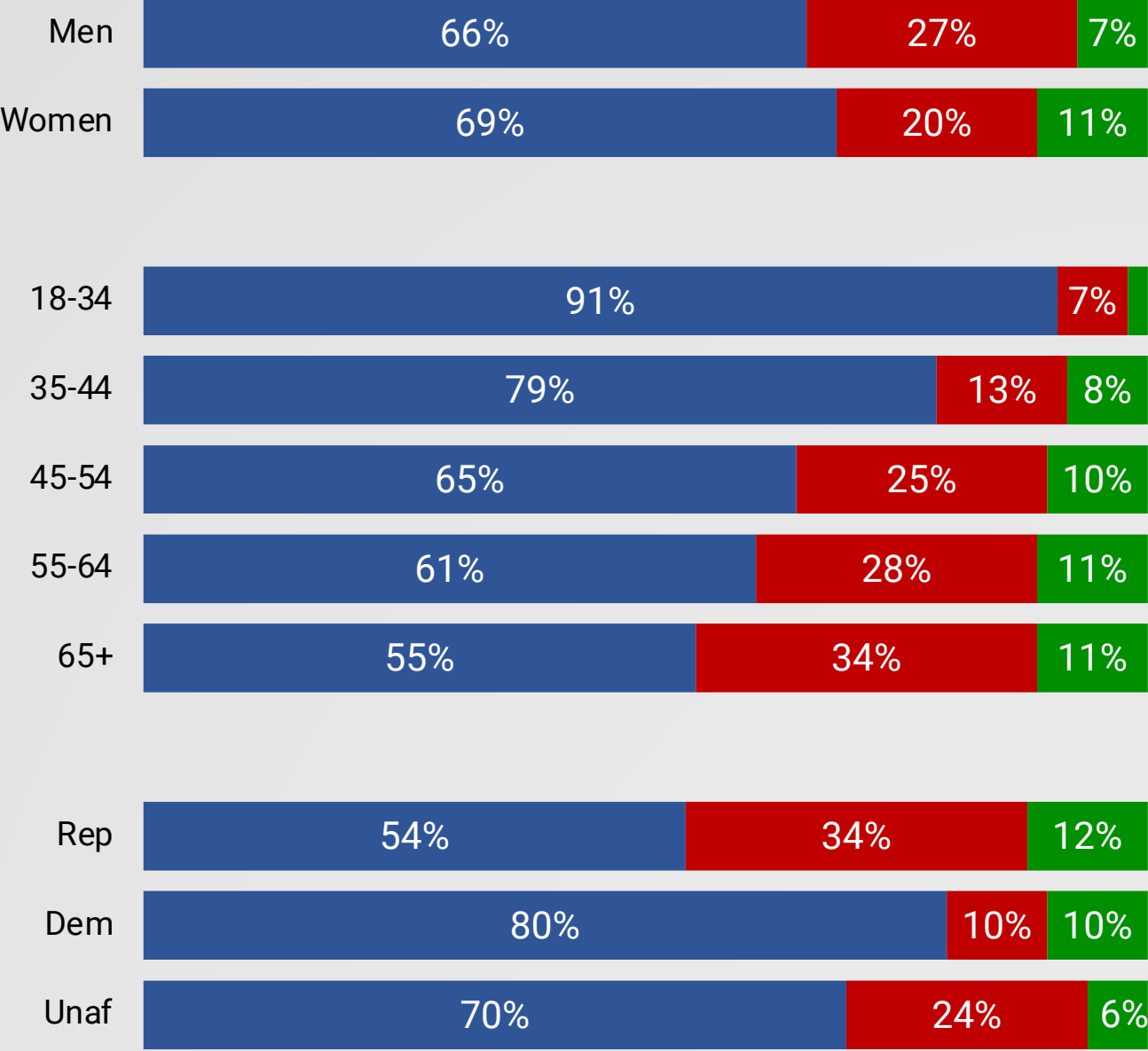

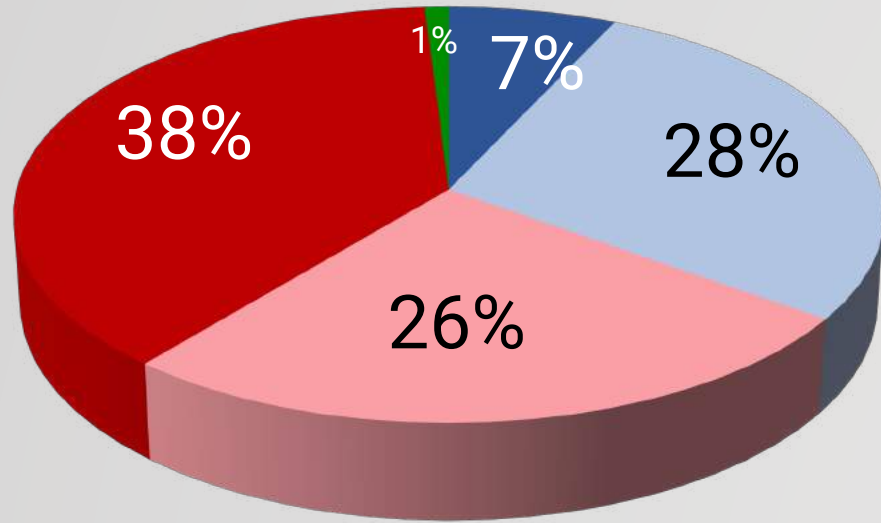

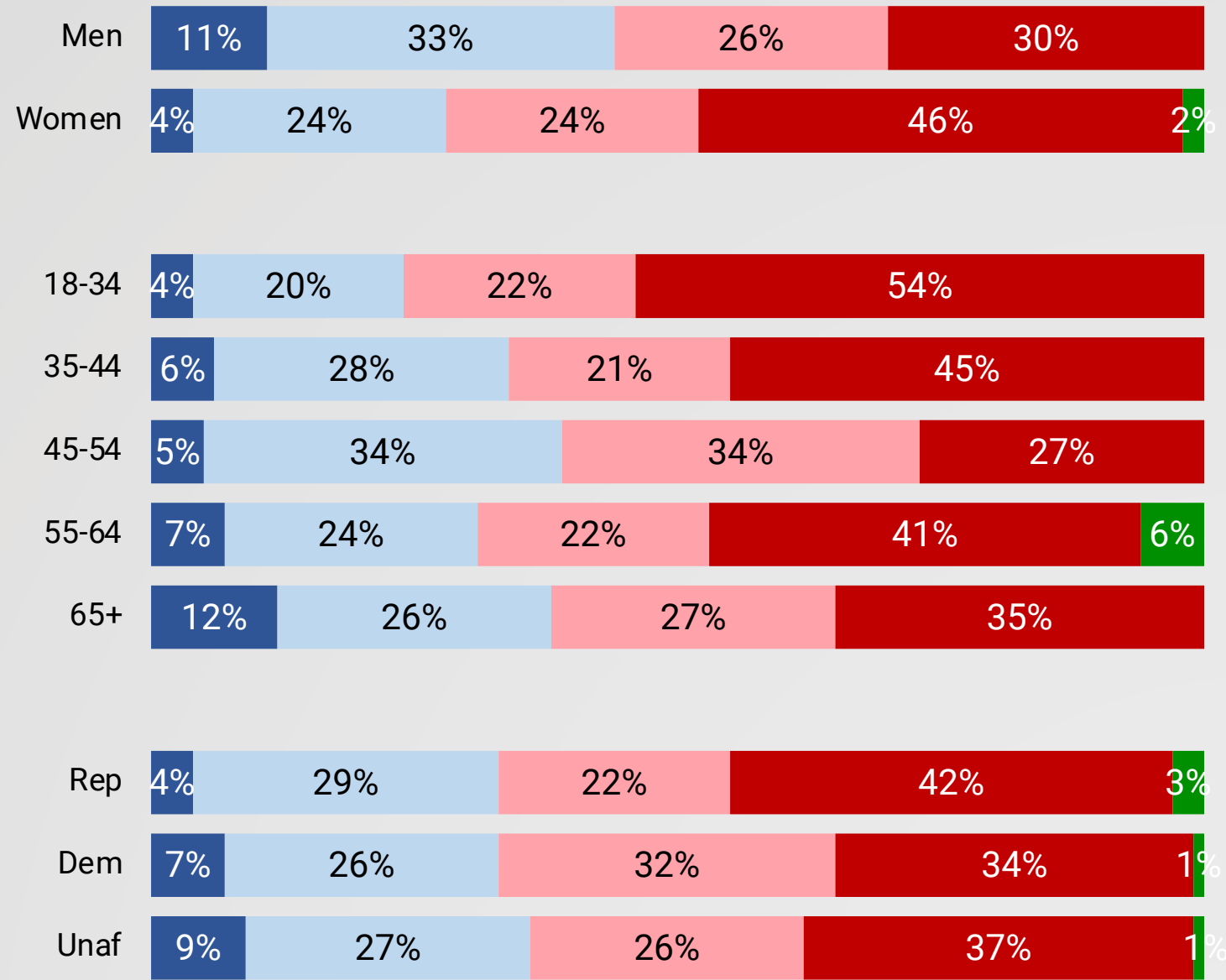

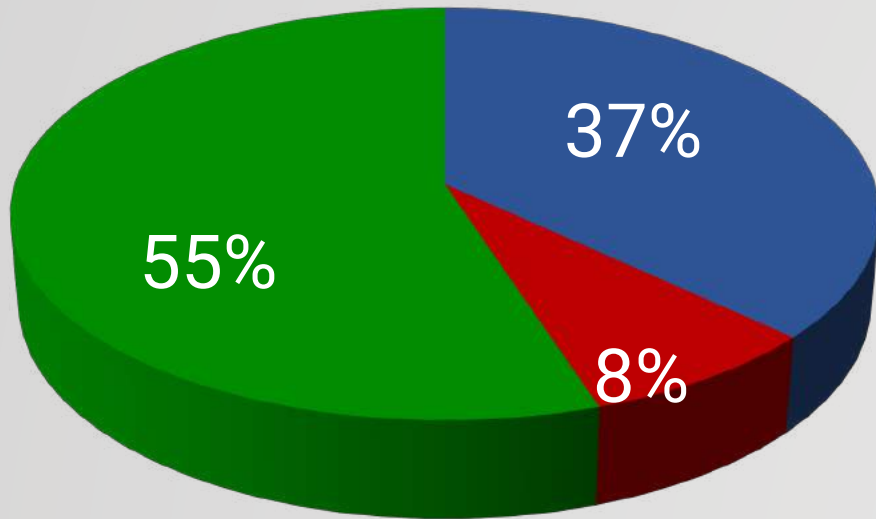

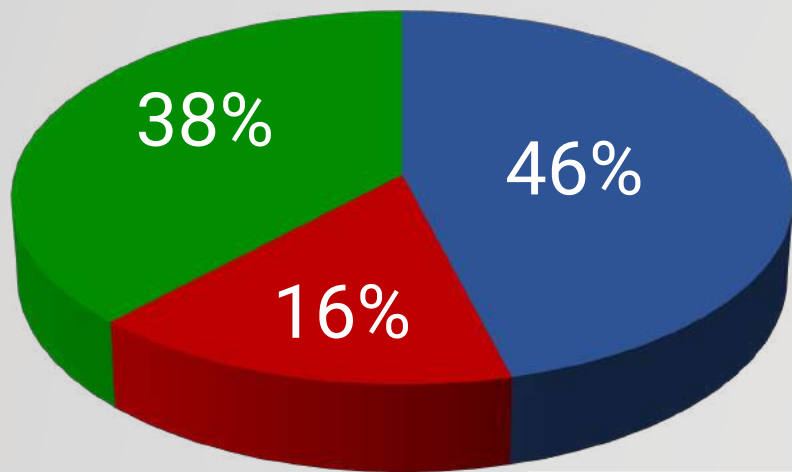
Home Rule Charter Commission Uninformed Ballot Test



As you may know, the first step to change a form of government from Statutory Rule to Home Rule is putting a ballot question before voters. The ballot question will ask voters to approve or reject the formation of a Home Rule Charter Commission. And at the same time, on the same ballot choose the members to serve on the Home Rule Charter Commission.

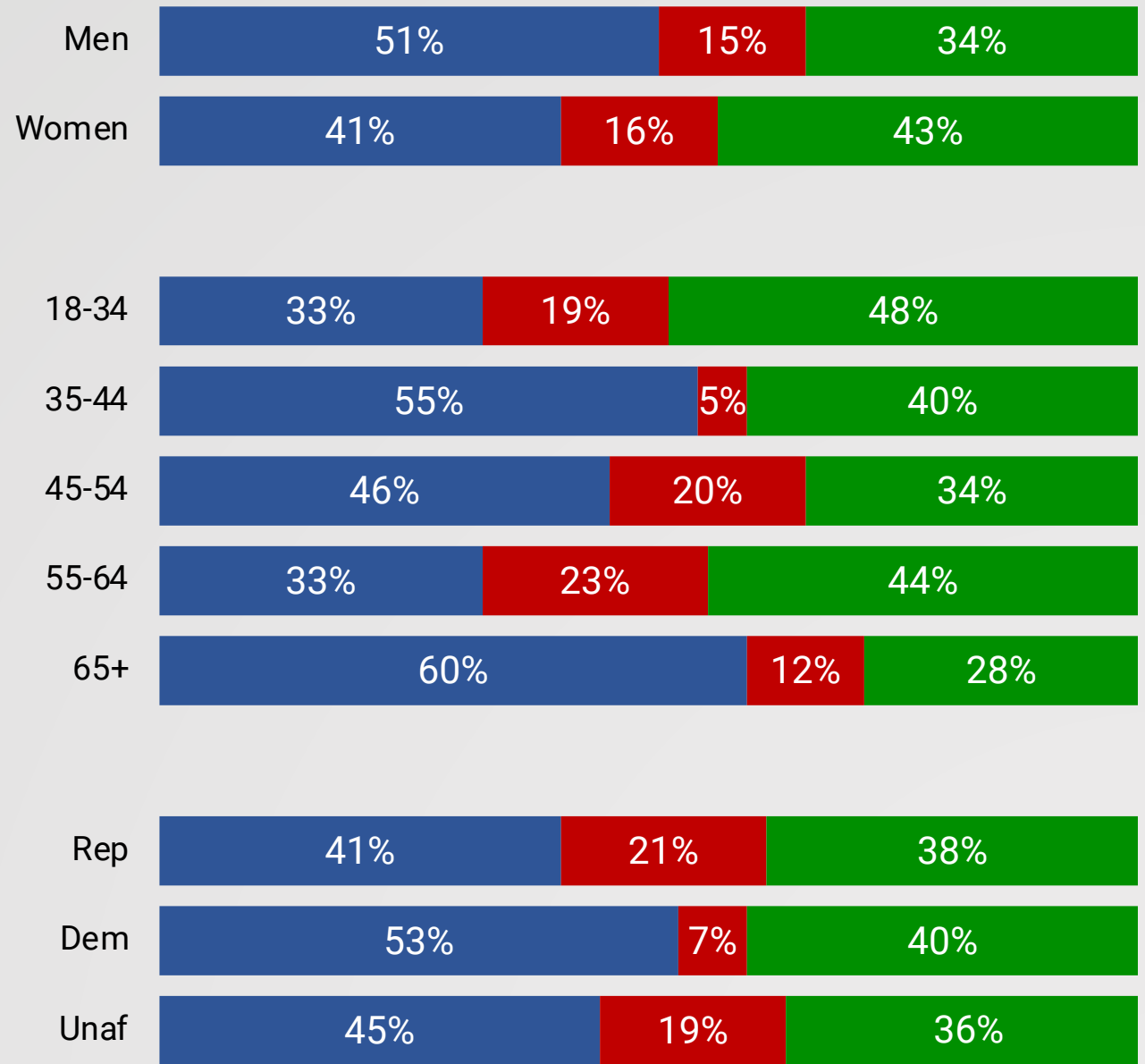

“I think locals should be the ones making the decision for our town, not the state.”

-Female, 45-54, Unaffiliated

“Home rule will give citizens and leaders in the town more say in how our town functions.” **-Female, 55-64, Democrat**

“It would allow greater flexibility in governance.” **-Male, 18-34, Democrat**

“From what I know about it, it allows Eagle residents to govern differently than the larger cities like Denver.” **-Male, 35-44, Republican**

“This gives voters the ability to choose and have their voices heard through the election process.” **-Female, 45-54, Democrat**

“Local government and policies are generally a more effective way of going about things.” **-Male, 35-44, Democrat**

“I support self-governing. The bigger the government, the less effective it is, so go local.” **-Male, 18-34, Unaffiliated**

“It is the next logical step for the town and would give greater control of the future of the town to it’s elected officials.” **-Male, 45-54, Unaffiliated**

“Local control is always better than larger government control. However, I would want to understand the driving forces of the candidates on the commission before approving.” **-Female, 35-44, Republican**

In your own words, being as descriptive as possible, please describe the reasons why you would vote yes and approve the ballot question to create a Home Rule Charter Commission. The top three reasons include:

- 1. Lack of Information and Understanding:** Many respondents express uncertainty and indecision due to a lack of understanding about what a Home Rule Charter Commission entails. They feel uninformed about the concept, its implications, and the differences between home rule and statutory governance. Some express a need for more detailed information, examples, and clarity about the potential benefits and drawbacks.
- 2. Desire for Further Research and Education:** Several respondents indicate a willingness to learn more about home rule before forming a decision. They express a need for additional research, education, and access to detailed information about the proposed change. Some mention a desire to understand the process, the roles of residents, and the selection of commission members.
- 3. Concerns and Skepticism about Change:** Some respondents express hesitancy due to concerns about the motives behind the proposal, potential political influences, and fears of unintended consequences. They question the necessity of change, express skepticism about the current administration's ability to implement it fairly, and worry about the impact on taxes, governance, and community representation.

“I do not know what a Home Rule Commission is.” -**Female, 18-34, Democrat**

“Before I vote on something, I need to be educated on things. I need to see the pros and cons.” -**Female, 55-64, Unaffiliated**

“I believe the reason Eagle want to convert is to raise taxes.” -**Male, 55-64, Republican**

“There is no evidence that Home Rule is better than Statutory Rule. Home Rule could increase taxes. Home Rule could also centralize power.” -**Male, 55-64, Unaffiliated**

“A lot more information needs to be made public...why do they want to change?” -**Female, 45-54, Republican**

“Not enough knowledge at this time to feel comfortable.” -**Male, 55-64, Republican**

“I don’t have a whole grasp on it, but I want to minimize the control of the government.” -**Male, 18-34, Libertarian**

“I am ignorant about it. I need to be educated more about the issue.” -**Male, 45-54, Unaffiliated**

“I don’t know what it is and since things are going well in Eagle, why create something different?” -**Female, 45-54, Unaffiliated**

In your own words, being as descriptive as possible, please describe the reasons why you would vote no and reject the ballot question to create a Home Rule Charter Commission. The top three reasons include:

- 1. Lack of Understanding and Information:** Many respondents express a lack of knowledge about what a Home Rule Charter Commission entails and its potential implications. They feel uninformed and unable to make a decision without a clear understanding of the proposed changes and their consequences. Some criticize the survey for not providing enough detailed information about the specific provisions of the charter.
- 2. Preference for State Statutes and Skepticism of Change:** Several respondents prefer to abide by existing state statutes and express skepticism about the need for change. They are concerned about potential self-serving motives behind the proposal and worry about the lack of confidence in the current town leadership to act in the best interest of the citizens. Some fear that home rule could lead to tax increases, reduce citizen representation, or empower special interest groups.
- 3. Desire for Further Education and Consideration:** Some respondents indicate a need for further education and consideration before making a decision. They feel that more information is necessary to understand the benefits and drawbacks of home rule and to weigh the potential consequences for the town of Eagle. Additionally, some express concerns about the timing of the proposal, suggesting that other priorities should take precedence.

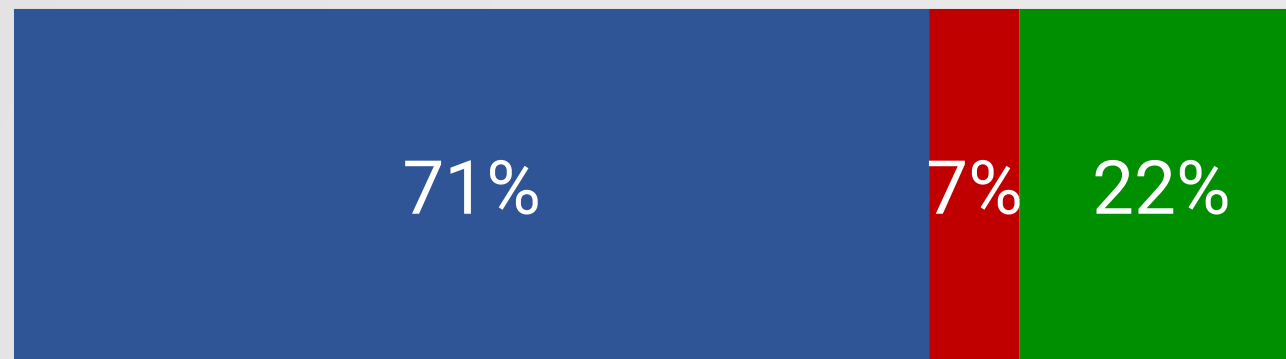
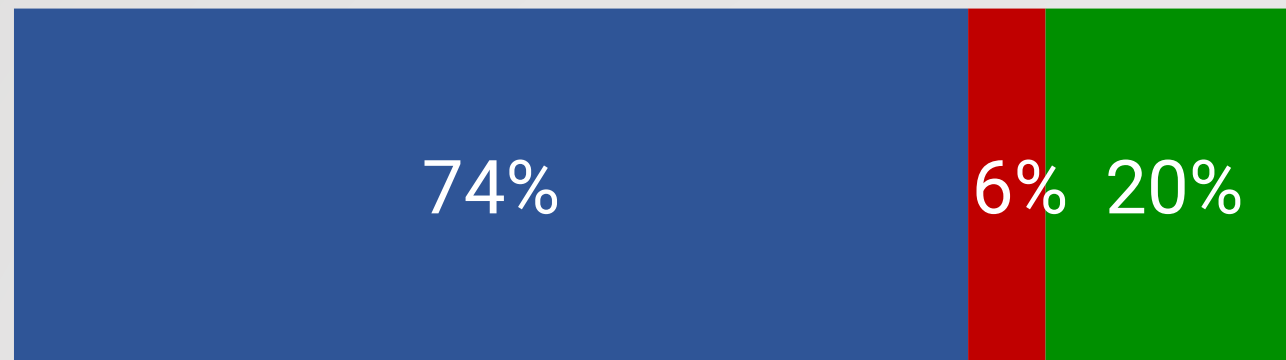

Federal and state laws under a Home Rule form of government still apply, but Home Rule municipalities have the power to make laws and policies regarding local issues with minimal state intervention instead of using a one size fits all statutory system.

Under Home Rule, the Eagle Board of Trustees will be able to protect and preserve the uniqueness of Eagle's values, culture and allow residents to control future changes to the town.



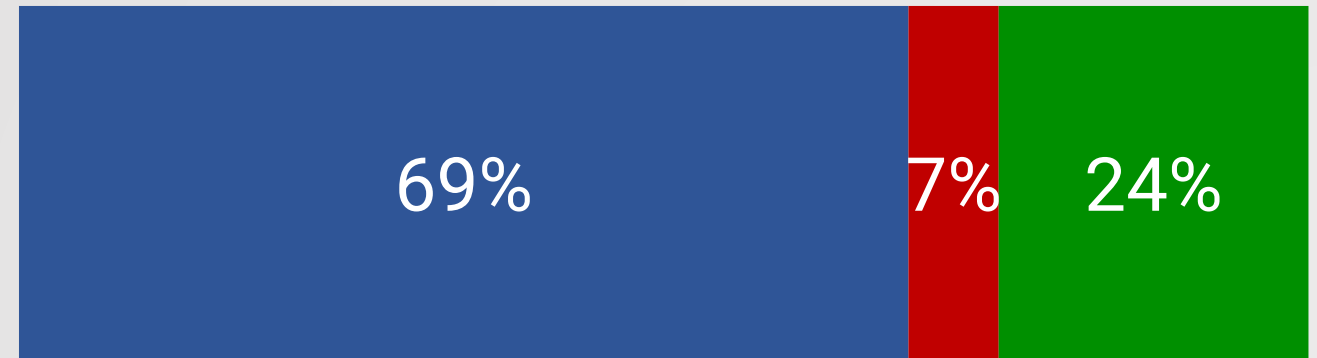
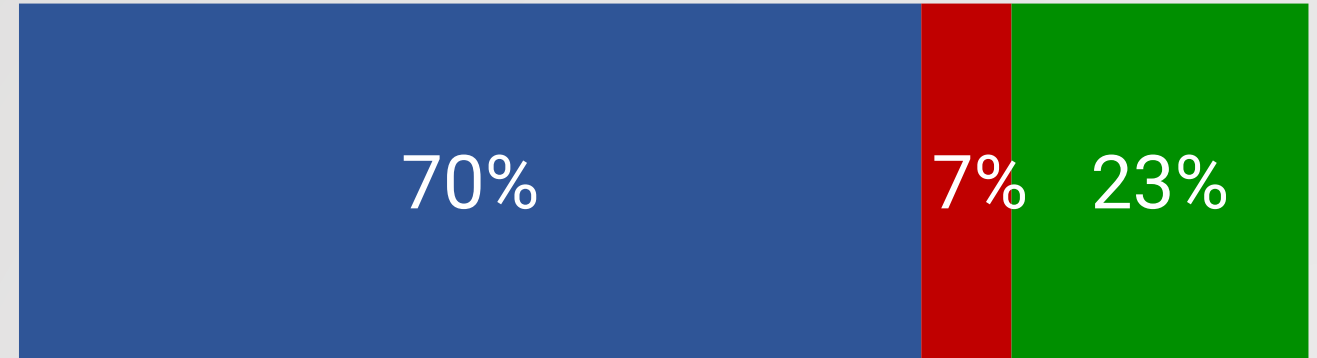

Under a Home Rule form of government, Eagle residents are given greater authority to create laws that meet the needs and expectations of the citizens instead of using a one size fits all statutory system.

Currently, any sales taxes that are collected from online shopping first goes to the state and then back to the Town of Eagle. Under Home Rule, the Town of Eagle would be able to directly collect the sales tax, which is much more efficient and beneficial to the functioning of local government.

Ninety-three percent of Colorado municipal residents live in a Home Rule community.

Under a Home Rule form of government, the Town of Eagle still has to abide by the TABOR Amendment, also known as the Taxpayer Bill of Rights, and ask Eagle voters to approve any future sales tax or mill levy increases.

If approved, a Home Rule Charter Commission would have one hundred and eighty days to draft a new Town charter. The new Charter would then be approved or rejected by the voters of Eagle in a future election.

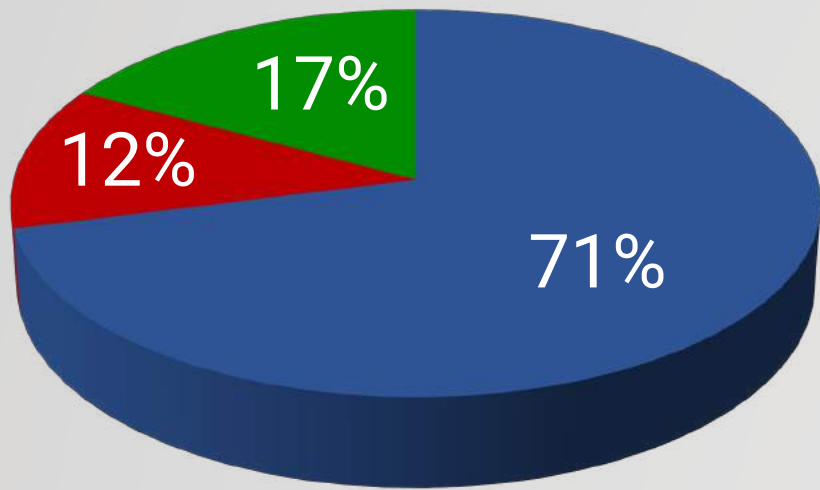


Home Rule Charter Commission Informed Ballot Test

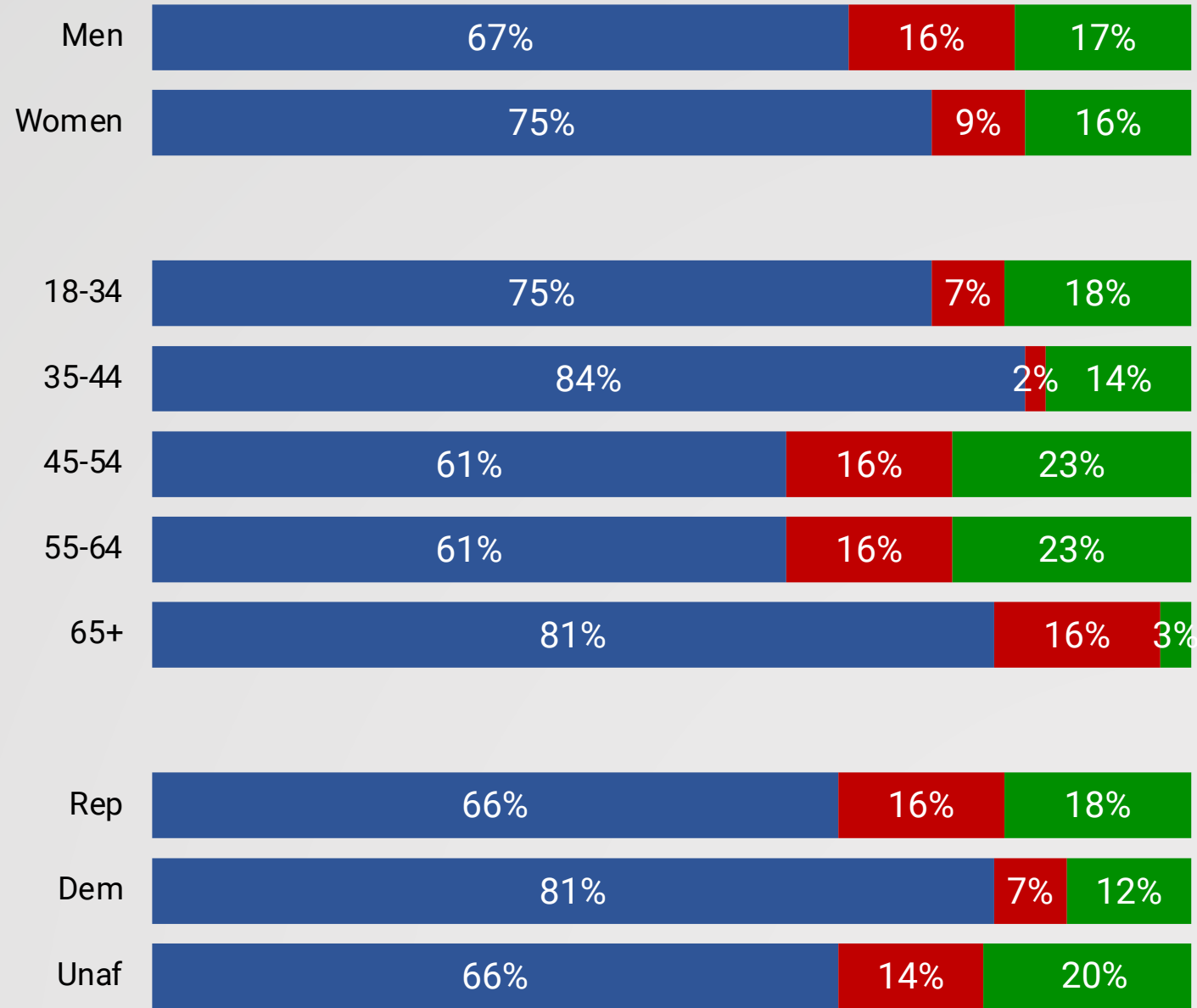

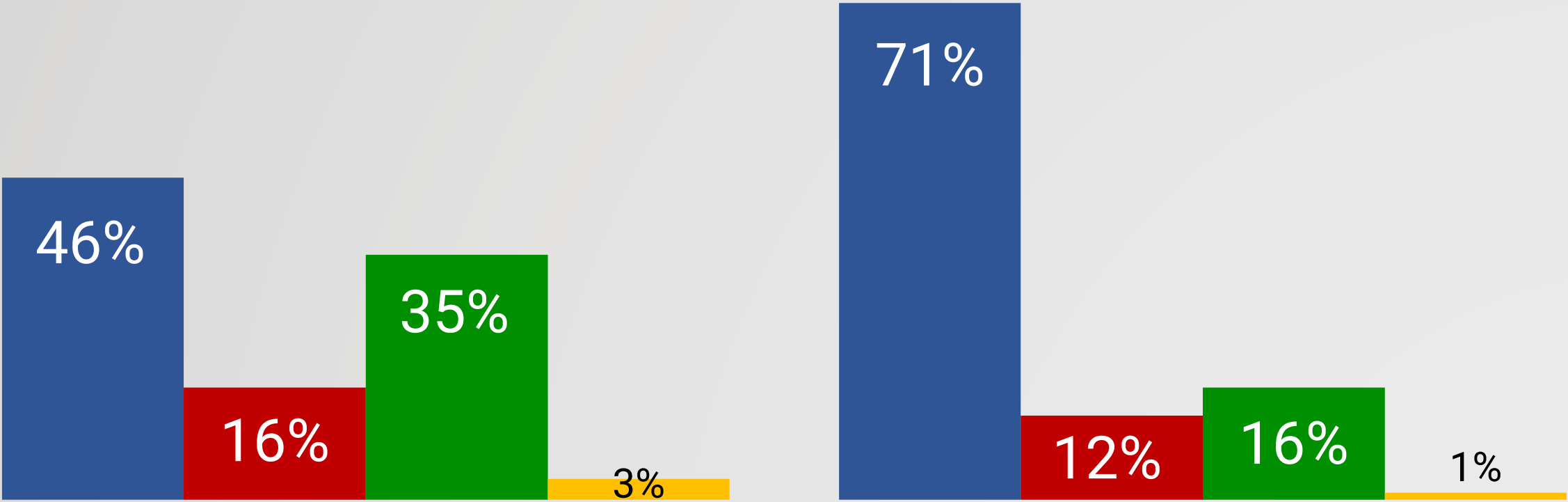

Key Findings & Insights



Currently 47% of likely 2019 Eagle voters would vote yes and approve a Home Rule Charter Commission, 16% would oppose it and 38% are undecided. The more voters learn about a Home Rule form of government the more likely they are to support it. After voters were informed of basic information about a Home Rule form of government, voter support increases from 47% to 71%.

Overall, a majority of Eagle voters are not aware or familiar with the Board of Trustee's actions to change Eagle's form of government from Statutory Rule to Home Rule. Among all respondents, 38% are not familiar at all with the effort and 26% not too familiar.

Voters primarily support a Home Rule form of government because they believe it will empower them with more local control. Voters oppose a Home Rule form of government mostly because they are not informed about what it is and what it would mean for the Town of Eagle.



Key Findings & Insights



74% of voters were more likely to support Home Rule after learning that federal and state laws still apply but municipalities have the power to make laws and policies regarding local issues with minimal state intervention.

71% of voters were more likely to support Home Rule after learning that the Eagle Board of Trustees would be able to protect and preserve the uniqueness of Eagle's values and culture and allow residents to control future changes to the town.

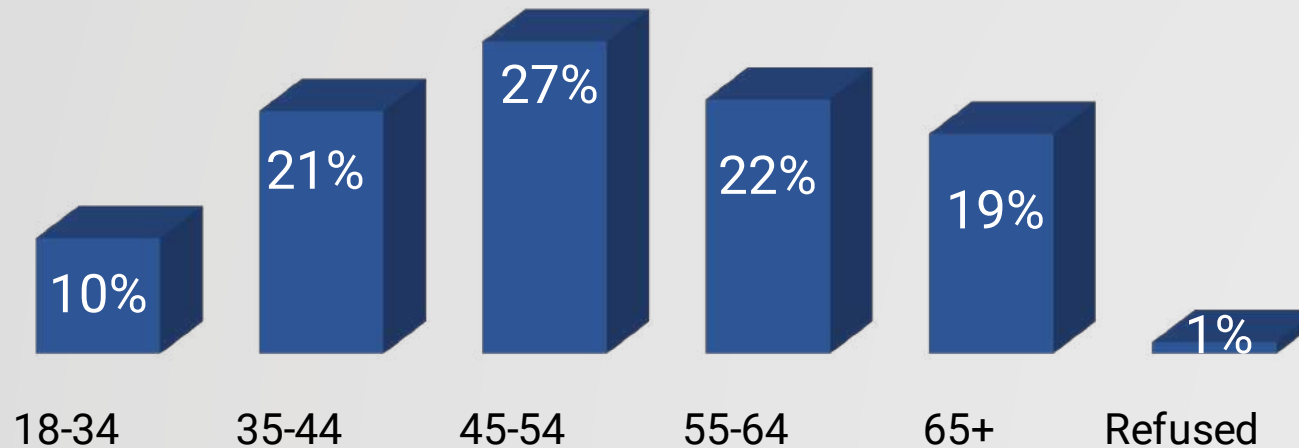
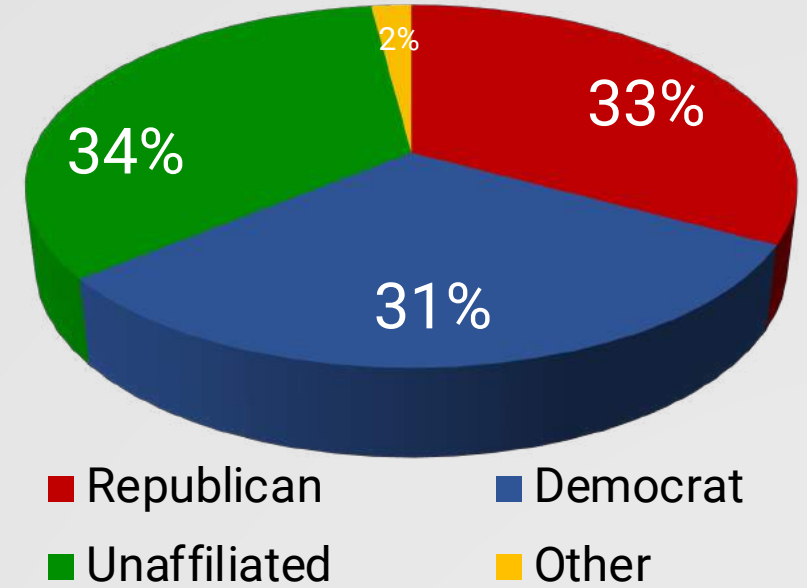
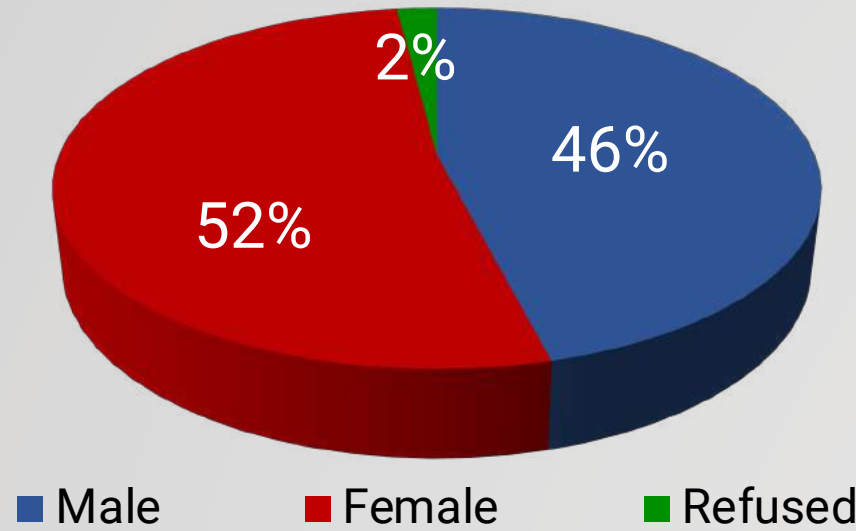


This survey finds that voter approval for a Town of Eagle Home Rule Charter Commission is likely this November with the assumption that voters will be well informed about the facts of Home Rule. The uninformed ballot test shows that 46% of likely voters already support the proposal, 16% oppose it and 38% are undecided.

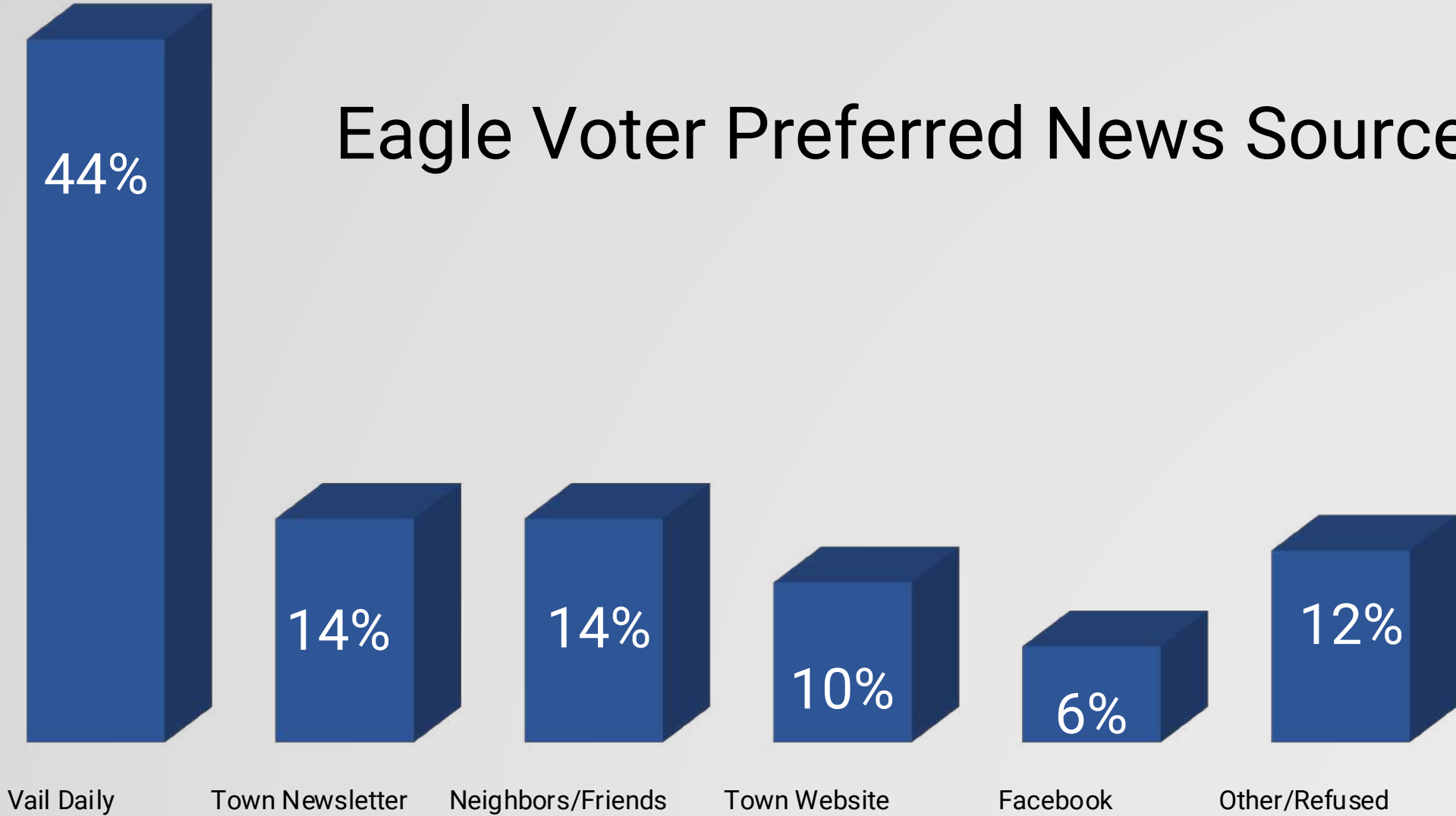
As voters learn about Home Rule, they become more likely to support it. This survey measured a 25% change in opinion from no or undecided to supporting it. We anticipate the change in opinion will occur as Eagle voters become more informed about the benefits of a Home Rule form of government.
